Another interpretation of the Parable of the Good Samaritan

Origen of Alexandria (183-253), one of the greatest thinkers of ancient times, became head of the catechetical school of Alexandria at the age of eighteen. In 230 he was ordained priest by the bishop of Caesarea. His life was entirely devoted to the study of scripture and he was also a great master of the spiritual life. His book On First Principles was the first great theological synthesis. His comparing the Good Samaritan to Christ was also echoed later by St Augustine.

To interpret the parable of the Good Samaritan, one of the elders used to say that the man going down from Jerusalem to Jericho was Adam. He said Jerusalem was paradise, Jericho was the world, and the brigands were enemy powers. The priest was the law, the Levite the prophets, and the Samaritan Christ. The inn, open to all who wished to enter, was the Church and the Son, and the innkeeper was the head of the Church, who was entrusted with its administration. The promised return of the Samaritan was a figure of the second coming of the Savior.


This Samaritan bore our sins and suffered on our behalf; he carried the half dead man to the inn which takes in everyone, denying no one its help; in other words, to the Church. To this inn Jesus invites all when he says: "Come to me, all who labour and are overburdened, and I will give you new strength."

This guardian of souls who showed mercy to the man who fell into the hands of brigands was a better neighbour to him than were either the law or the prophets, and he proved this more by deeds than by words.

Now the saying: "Be imitators of me as I am of Chrimakes it clear that

we can imitate Christ by showing mercy to those who have fallen into the hands of brigands. We can go to them, bandage their wounds after pouring in oil and wine, place them on our own mount, and bear their burdens.

And so the Son of God exhorts us to do these things, in words addressed not only to the teacher of the law but to all of us: "Go and do likewise." If we do, we shall gain eternal life in Christ Jesus, "to whom belongs glory and power for ever and ever. Amen."
