Recession.

We seem to hear nothing but talk of recession these days. We have certainly had good times even if most of us only benefited moderately and quite a number did not benefit at all. However there had been a lot of criticism of excess and extravagant spending. Now we are hearing words such as greed to describe some of what went on. There is no doubt that in places Christian values were forgotten or ignored. Yet in the midst of the "Celtic Tiger" there was a lot of generosity and many charities and voluntary organisations did well.

Of necessity we have to be more sparing and more frugal in our spending in the present climate. Lent can be a help in putting a Christian dimension on what we need to do. Lent a time of self denial - not out of necessity - but because we want to make a voluntary response in gratitude for what we have and what we enjoy.

Prayer, fasting, almsgiving are the three pillars of Lent. These help us to look beyond ourselves, to be grateful for what we have and to be conscious of those who have very little. The word recession is meaningless to a majority of people in the world. Still a recession does effect them. Lent and particularly our Trocaire Lenten campaign helps us to be aware and to reach out.
